Civil Society and Public Policy: A Directory of Non-Profit Organizations Engaged in Public Policy

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INTRODUCTION

This directory of organizations engaged in public policy reflects the richness of the voluntary sector and its policy activities across Canada. Although neither an exhaustive listing nor a statistically representative sample, it is a sound diagonal slice and provides an overview of the range and breadth of organizations involved in public policy. This directory will facilitate connections between sector organizations who are seeking policy collaborators in their field or in their community, or who are searching for policy material. And as a first edition, it can act as a basis for creating broader, more comprehensive versions.

This directory contains many of the non-profit organizations recognized and dedicated to public policy engagement. They are acknowledged as such either from a research thrust, or a fund-raising focus, or because public policies are their *raison d'être*—i.e. the organization exists to influence or create public policies on a particular issue. The directory also includes many organizations in communities across Canada that self-identified as engaged in public policy in a proactive, on-going and significant way.

This first edition of the directory begins with a description of how it was developed. Following that is an explanation of why organizations engage in public policy, with an overview of which organizations do so and what kind of policy activity they undertake.

HOW THE DIRECTORY WAS CREATED

The information about organizations in this directory was gathered through a web-based survey. Beginning with a focus on particular cities, key umbrella organizations within those communities, and umbrella groups representing the major subject areas within the policy community, were identified. They were asked for their assistance in disseminating the survey to their member organizations and others in their communities and networks, requesting that the survey be filled out in full. Since the request from those key organizations asked those responding to forward the request to other organizations involved in policy work, a kind of "viral e-mail" was created. Responses were subsequently received from organizations across the country, contributing depth and breadth to the listing provided here.

The survey was not necessarily inclusive in targeting the full scope of the non-profit sector involved in policy work: rather, it zeroed in on those organizations obviously engaged in public policy, inviting them to identify themselves and describe what kind of policy work they do, on which issues, at what level(s), and with whom. In other words, it relied on self-selection within some clear criteria: being non-profit, based in Canada, and engaged in public policy. Organizations were included if they met the basic criteria and indicated a field and a type of policy work; they were excluded if they did not. Responses were not verified and no attempt was made to measure or assess the quality or extent of their policy work.

WHY SOME NON-PROFIT ORGANIZATIONS ENGAGE N PUBLIC POLICY

Organizations engaged in public policy include nearly every type, size and field across the non-profit sector. But only some organizations involve themselves in this way. Why is it that some get involved but others, in fact the great majority, do not?


There are a number of motivations for this kind of focus:

- Some organizations are created for the purpose of carrying out research and policy development per se, in given fields or from a particular perspective or basis of expertise. They do so to explore issues and recommend directions to policy makers; for example, think tanks, research institutes, and social planning councils.
- Many organizations that provide services move into public policy work in order to find/promote public policy solutions to the problems and needs of their clients and those they serve—to move to address systemic causes underlying the conditions they face in service provision; for example, many social service organizations, immigrantserving organizations, and disability groups.
- Similarly, many organizations are formed to bring together the perspective of particular population groups (seniors, youth, women) to shape public policies and the impact—intended or unintended—these have on those populations.
- A large number of organizations are formed for the purpose of addressing a particular issue and their central purpose, along with public awareness and mutual support, is the adoption of public policies on these issues; for example, international development organizations, health charities, and organizations focused on the environment and safety.

In short, organizations engage in public policy either as an intrinsic part of their *raison d'être* as a policy or cause-based organization, or as a logical next step in carrying out the delivery of their services.

WHICH ORGANIZATIONS ENGAGE IN PUBLIC POLICY, AND WHAT KIND OF PUBLIC POLICY

The description of which organizations are engaged in public policy reflects the structure and composition of the voluntary/non-profit sector as a whole. The following depicts these dimensions:



What is noteworthy is that these dimensions operate in all possible combinations: there are organizations in every policy area active at the international, national, provincial and local levels, and in all possible organizational forms. There are organizations for each population group, sometimes stand-alone (for example, the *Provincial Council of Women of*

Manitoba), and sometimes in combination with given policy areas (for example, *Women's Habitat*), and in various organizational forms.

Policy Fields and Populations Represented

The organizations listed in this directory include those active in all the suggested areas of arts and culture, sports and recreation, economic development, education (including popular education and literacy), environment, faith-based, health, housing, human rights/social justice, immigration/refugees/settlement, international development, and social services. There are a number of additional areas in which these organizations are active, including consumer rights, employment, governance, citizen engagement, fiscal policy, penal systems, addiction issues, peace and security, *l'économie sociale*, food security, social development, trade, and linguistic minorities; some are involved in subsets and particular applications of the categories listed above.

As well as subject areas for policy focus, there are many organizations based on population groups—women, aboriginal, people with disabilities, seniors, children and youth, and diversity groups. In some cases, these are group-specific organizations active on many policy fronts, while others are both group- and issue-specific. Such organizations exist at the national, provincial and local levels.

Among respondents, the largest percentage were active in the policy field of social services (35%), followed by health (31%) and human rights/social justice (28%), and education (27%). (Many organizations are active in more than one policy field and selected more than one in the survey; therefore, the percentages total more than 100.)

Level of Policy Activity

Where an organization is based, or even whether it is local, provincial/territorial or national in scope, does not determine the levels of its public policy focus. For example, while most local organizations are focused on direct service delivery, such organizations may end up working at the national policy level, simply because of the anomalies of the division of powers among levels of government in Canada. Whether the focus is international development, social policy, health services, or education, the policy area may lead organizations to take shape at several levels of activity, and to develop and advocate policies at different levels of government.

For example, a local organization serving immigrants and refugees would likely find itself working at the local level on education or law-enforcement issues, at the provincial level on issues related to social assistance, employment

(accreditation), housing, and human rights, and at a national level on issues related to immigration, foreign policy, and human rights. The organization might even work internationally on international conventions and reporting. Examples of such local organizations in this directory include the *Calgary Catholic Immigration Centre*, the *Victoria Immigrant and Refugee Centre*, and the *Penticton & District Multicultural Society*.

Similarly, while a national or even global issue may be the focus of an organization (for example, climate change), it might direct itself to local policy interventions (land-use decisions by municipal governments). Examples of such organizations in this directory include *Canadian Arctic Resources Committee Canada, Pollution Probe*, and *Climate Change Action Network*.

Organizations were asked about the scope or geographic reach of their activities: 20% said their focus was international, at least in part; 43% focus on national issues; and the largest percentage are involved in issues or represent voices at the provincial (47%), local (46%) or regional (33%) levels (again bearing in mind multiple levels reported by many organizations).

Type of Policy Activity

The survey asked respondents which type of public policy engagement they undertake:

- identifying issues, raising awareness and getting issues on the public policy agenda;
- developing policy solutions, through research and analysis ("policy-ready research"); or
- mobilizing and promoting particular policy solutions.

The responses make clear that all three kinds are found right across the spectrum of policy fields and levels of organization; organizations which are active in some but not all types of policy activity are most likely to focus on identifying issues and raising awareness (89% reported such activity). The promotion of policy solutions, also known as advocacy, lobbying, and mobilizing, was reported by 66%. The third type of policy activity, the development of policy solutions—often the most difficult and requiring considerable expertise—was reported by 58% of the organizations.

While the understanding of these terms may vary somewhat across organizations, the above breakdown is likely an accurate reflection of how organizations come into public policy engagement, beginning with building awareness and understanding of their issue(s), then lobbying or campaigning for particular approaches, and then, with greater knowledge and experience, moving into the development and design of particular policy solutions.

Organizational Forms

The respondents listed in this directory include all types of policy organizations: think tanks, national associations, umbrella organizations, coalitions and working groups coalescing other organizations at a particular level or around a particular issue, and stand-alone organizations.

Think Tanks

Some organizations are created for the purpose of carrying out research and policy development per se, in given fields or from a particular perspective or basis of expertise. They do so to explore and analyze issues and recommend directions to policy makers. Not only are they non-profit organizations engaged in policy in their own right, but their research is often used to inform the policy activities of other policy organizations.

Think tanks come in various organizational forms, from non-profit corporations to foundations. While most conduct original or applied research, often commissioned by governments or other organizations, they vary in terms of their activity. Some release research results only, while others develop and may advocate particular policy solutions for the issues raised in their research.

While they are geographically dispersed in cities across Canada, most think tanks are national in scope. Some—for example, *Canadian Policy Research Networks*, the *Conference Board of Canada*, and the *Canada West Foundation*—cover a wide variety of subjects. Others focus on particular subject areas as, for example, the *Caledon Institute of Social Policy*, the *Vanier Institute of the Family*, and the *Canadian Institute for Environmental Law and Policy*.

Particular forms of think tanks are social planning councils with a municipal or regional base. Examples in this directory include the *Social Planning and Research Council of British Columbia*, and the *Social Planning Councils of Toronto, Winnipeg, and North Okanagan*.

A significant amount of the research and analysis undertaken in Canada occurs in academic institutes, such as the Munk Centre at the University of Toronto, or the Saskatchewan Institute of Public Policy at the University of Saskatchewan. Such research centers affiliated with universities are not included in this directory, nor are academic institutions themselves (although some have programs which are included in the listing of Training and Resources).

Chapters and Branches in Federations

Many organizations operate in federations with local chapters or branches.

A national-level organization can have been created by similar organizations already in operation, or a national office may precede the creation of local branches. The links between the members and the national body can range from policy direction to financial support, to coordinated documentation. Member chapters may be engaged in public policy issues in each of their communities but the national organization will typically engage on framework issues or national-level issues affecting all members. Faith organizations often operate in this way; for example, the *United Church of Canada*. Other examples in this directory include the *Canadian Public Health Association*, the *ALS Society of Canada*, the *Consumers Council of Canada*, and the *YMCA*.

Such organizations also exist at the provincial and even the local levels. Examples included in this directory: *Volunteer Alberta, New Brunswick Senior Citizens Federation, Canadian Cancer Society Nova Scotia,* and *Fédération québécoise des sociétés Alzheimer.*

Member Associations/Umbrella Organizations

Many of the organizations included in this directory exist to develop and/or promote policies to meet the needs of particular populations, some of which may be less able to develop policy and advocate on their own behalf. These organizations typically form with others into associations often with an umbrella organization representing the members collectively. Examples of policy organizations in this directory working on behalf of marginalized populations are the *Canadian Association for Community Living*, the *Council of Canadians with Disabilities*, and the *Canadian Association for Community Care*.

Other populations, while able to advocate on their own behalf, have developed policy organizations to provide more collective voices. Examples include the *Canadian Conference of the Arts*, the *Canadian Association for the Fifty Plus*, *Canadian Council on Social Development*, *Canadian Ethnocultural Council*, and the *Canadian National Institute for the Blind*.

Similar organizations exist at the provincial level, and even the local level, to meet the policy needs of their clients or members. Local level examples in this directory include *Saskatoon Communities for Children, Yellowknife Women's Society*, the *Independent Living Housing Society of Victoria*, and *Comité régional d'éducation pour le développement international de Lanaudière*.

Coalitions/Working Groups

These groups are clusters of other organizations, often working on policy issues individually, that choose to work collectively on broad issues that are of shared interest. They are often triggered by particular legislative or policy initiatives, or

by an interest in getting a policy issue on the public and legislative agenda. Coalitions and less formal groupings have existed on issues as diverse as housing, capital punishment, child care, education, foreign policy and international development, and poverty. While some coalitions are short-lived and formed to respond to or initiate a particular policy issue or solution, others are more enduring (especially likely in the case of chronic issues such as child poverty).

Coalitions whose members are other organizations exist at the local, provincial/territorial, or federal levels; what they have in common may be shared research, a coordinated campaign of public and government awareness, or the development of a common policy agenda. Examples in the directory include the *National Children's Alliance*, the *Coalition for Nursing Home Rights*, *Mines Action Canada*, and *Toronto City Summit Alliance*.

Other coalitions emerge through the leadership of a small group of individuals, and draw on the support of individual members or contributors to sustain their efforts. They are generally specific in purpose, and may emerge in response to a specific threat or event, but can endure as ongoing voices in the policy field. Examples in this directory include *Friends of Canadian Broadcasting, Canadian Parents for French, Mothers Against Drunk Driving, Council for Access to the Profession of Engineering*, and *Association des troubles d'apprentissage*.

A relatively new category of organizations is those serving and/or representing a cross-section of voluntary organizations, i.e., those concerned with infrastructure and capacity of the sector itself, working to strengthen capacity and foster an enabling environment. While many focus on information exchange, and meeting the operational needs of voluntary organizations, most also have a policy component and seek to advocate, with policy makers, on behalf of voluntary organizations or the sector as a whole. Such national organizations listed in the directory include *Imagine Canada*, *Volunteer Canada*, and *Institute for Media*, *Policy and Civil Society*. Such coalitions are playing a similar role at the provincial and territorial level; examples in this directory include *Voluntary and Non-profit Sector of Manitoba Inc.*, *Volunteer Alberta*, and *Quebec Community Groups Network*. More such local organizations include the *Chambers of Charities of Calgary and Edmonton*, the *Vancouver Community Network*, the *Pillar Non-Profit Network* (London), and *Ie Comité aviseur de l'action communautaire autonome*.

Stand-alone Organizations

The survey of those engaged in public policy asked whether organizations worked alone, or in networks or coalitions. The responses confirm the perception that many organizations (some would say too many) engage in public policy

work on their own: 89% report that they work alone; 76% reported they worked in ad hoc coalitions or working groups; and only 58%, in formal or enduring coalitions and partnerships.

Organizations operating on their own are found locally, provincially and nationally. Many are community-based centers or facilities which move into public policy to better serve their clients; for example, *St. Christopher House*, *Santropol Roulant*, and *Jessie's Centre for Teenagers*. Often, their level of operation is synonymous with the scope of the issue they are addressing (as, for example, a particular environmental problem), but sometimes they reflect a desire to act locally on an issue that might be pan-Canadian or even world-wide.

Some organizations are national in that they are a voice for a pan-Canadian population or for pan-Canadian issues; for example, the *National Organization of Immigrant and Visible Minority Women in Canada*, the *Portuguese-Canadian National Congress, DES Action Canada*, or *Lupus Canada*.

Other organizations operate as professional or trade associations and engage in public policy on issues of concern to their members and to their profession. These groupings are national or provincial, shaped by which jurisdiction has responsibility for regulating, and by the scope of perceived common interest. Examples include the *Association of Canadian Archivists, Dieticians of Canada*, and the *Canada-Bangladesh Business Council*. Some at the provincial level include *la Fédération des Agricultrices du Québec*, or the *Association of Registered Nurses of Newfoundland and Labrador*.

TRAINING AND RESOURCES FOR PUBLIC POLICY ENGAGEMENT

Organizations in the non-profit sector develop their capacity to engage in public policy in many ways: staff take courses at universities and colleges; they participate in workshops and seminars through the provincial or national organizations to which they belong; they use a series of tools that describe the public policy processes of the federal/provincial/territorial/municipal governments and how to influence those policies; they consult books and web-sites that convey best practices and share lessons about what works.

In the survey on public policy engagement, organizations were asked what training and resources they had used to develop their own capacity in public policy engagement. This list is based on their responses and reflects some of the sources where members of the non-profit sector can learn public policy engagement.

The first section addresses Training. Part 1 describes a number of academic centres conducting training. This list does not include the many policy schools which teach public policy but are not directed particularly to members of the voluntary sector. Nor does it include the many academic institutions teaching management or fundraising for the non-profit sector. Institutions where the academic focus includes the development of leadership in the sector were included on the grounds that policy capacity is a key component of leadership.

Part 2 lists training and development in public policy within the non-profit sector itself. In addition to those organizations listed here, many national, provincial and umbrella organizations provide training, often very practical hands-on training, to their members at conferences and professional development sessions. Some organizations like *United Way* undertake to make such training available for their agencies. Although they are not listed here, these are the key sources of policy training for many organizations.

The second section is a listing of resources useful in public policy engagement. It includes websites and publications which are easily accessible. It also includes some international sources which, while not directly applicable, provide a distillation of experiences and advice.
